INDIGENOUS CULTURAL TOURISM: HOW THE NORTH IS LEARNING FROM COMMUNITY SUCCESS IN SOUTHERN CANADA

The successes of cultural tourism in Canada's southern Aboriginal communities are providing an important roadmap for development of Indigenous cultural tourism in the North, a sector expected to grow significantly in coming years, say northern communities and tourism organizations.

The Government of Northwest Territories' Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment, the Indigenous Tourism Association of Canada (ITAC), and Northwest Territories Tourism (NWTT), recently signed a memorandum of understanding to develop Indigenous cultural tourism in the territory and includes new annual investments of up to \$257,000. The majority of the 2018-2019 funding will be directed towards workshops and marketing, many geared towards growing local businesses to be able to better handle visitors from southern Canada and international visitors, as well creating greater awareness about what's NWT has to offer.

Looking at the four imposing rows of solar panels on the east end of Regina, Cowessess First Nation Chief Cadmus Delorme says the band's latest renewable energy project has a definite "wow" factor. It's clear that renewable energy is an emerging powerhouse, Delorme said, with SaskPower stating its own goal is to to see 50 per cent of the power used in the province come from renewable sources by 2030. Jim Wilson, Minister of Economic Development, Small Business and Trade held a "red tape reduction" roundtable discussion in North Bay Thursday to get a northern perspective from the local business community. Fedeli says it will take giving business the tools they need. "By lowering their taxes, by lowering the requirements, by cutting red tape. Look at the Ring of Fire. The one company took two years just to get an environmental assessment approval, to do an environmental assessment. It should have taken 45 days. Two years to get the right to be able to spend millions of dollars, and the next four years doing the real assessment. OTTAWA, DEHCHO FIRST NATIONS SIGN DEAL FOR 1ST INDIGENOUS PROTECTED WILDLIFE AREA

Environment Minister Catherine McKenna has signed an agreement with Dehcho First Nations Grand Chief Gladys Norwegian to officially protect the Edehzhie area, creating the first Indigenous-protected national wildlife area in Canada. "Past leaders and elders have worked diligently to protect the Edehzhie so that it will be here for future generations," Dehcho First Nations Grand Chief Gladys Norwegian said Thursday. "The Dene have a special relationship with the land."

'IT'S HARD WORK': SAWMILL TRAINING PROGRAM BRINGS SKILLS TO K'ATL'ODEECHE FIRST NATION

A sawmill that has been sitting at K'atl'odeeche First Nation for more than four years is finally getting some use. Three community members are being trained to use the machine so they can start producing lumber in the community. "It's hard work," said trainer Murphy Pottage. "But it's a skill that they can carry with them the rest of their lives." The N.W.T.'s Department of Education, Culture and Employment, the Aboriginal Skills and Employment Training Strategy, Aurora College, and the K'atl'odeeche First Nation worked together to bring Pottage into the community, who is training residents for free. The First Nation bought the sawmill years ago, but this is the first time people will be trained to use the equipment.
