SMELTER BID USING RAIL STILL POSSIBLE

According to Timmins officials, they are not giving up yet on their bid to host a ferrochrome smelter in that city — a bid they say would include heavy dependence on Ontario Northland rail. When Noront Resources announced earlier this month it would build its ferrochrome smelter in Sault Ste. Marie instead of in Timmins, Mayor George Pirie emphasized that there is a lot of time to reverse that decision. "Their announcement said 2025 but we know that their process is — that they've got to build a nickel mine first before they begin to access the chromite deposit," the mayor said. "We know that the MoUs (Memorandums of Understanding) haven't been signed with the indigenous people and we do not believe that they've got the environmental permits in place to build a ferrochrome facility on the shores of the Great Lakes."

PIMICIKAMAK CREE NATION MEMBERS TRAINING FOR HUDBAY MINING JOBS IN SNOW LAKE

A dozen members of Pimicikamak Cree Nation (PCN) at Cross Lake are being trained for mining sector jobs at Hudbay's Snow Lake operation through a partnership between the company, the provincial government, PCN, University College of the North (UCN) and the Northern Manitoba Sector council. The training began in February and will conclude in November. The provincial government is providing \$87,000 in funding for the training, with Hudbay and PCN contributing in-kid support.

FOREST HARVESTING OFFERS JOB OPPORTUNITIES TO FIRST NATIONS

After six weeks of in-classroom instruction, 10 members of three area First Nations received a chance to show their hands-on skills with harvesting machines this week at a job site 400 kilometres north of Thunder Bay. The Agoke Development Corporation arranged with equipment suppliers to deliver a buncher, a skidder and a harvester to the Ogoki Forest, which lies east of Wabakimi Provincial Park. ADC is a company jointly run by Aroland, Eabametoong and Marten Falls First Nations, It harvests and manages the 11,000-square-kilometre Ogoki Forest under an arrangement with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. The trainees have been enrolled in a 10-week program administered by Confederation College.
