# FORD GOVERNMENT ATTACKS RED TAPE IN NEW BILL, BUT ENVIRONMENTALISTS SAY IT GOES TOO FAR CBC - Oct 29

CBC News - The Ford government's first new legislation after a long summer break is aimed at reducing red tape and modernizing regulations, but there are worries that some of the proposed changes could weaken environmental protections. The bill, called the Better for People, Smarter for Business Act, was introduced on Monday at Queen's Park. If passed, the legislation would result in regulatory changes across a wide variety of areas, including the environment, agriculture, food safety, alcohol, mining, post-secondary education, insurance, and many others. "All too often, regulations make things harder than they should be," said Prabmeet Sarkaria, associate minister for Small Business and Red Tape Reduction, in a news release.

### NORONT RAISING \$2.5 MILLION FOR RING OF FIRE

Noront is hoping to extract nickel and chromite from its properties in the Ring of Fire area in partnership with local First Nations. Those properties include the company's 100%-owned Eagle's Nest deposit, which it has described as the highest- grade nickel-sulphide find in Canada since the Voisey's Bay discovery in Labrador. On Monday, Noront said it has arranged a non-brokered private placement of any combination of units of the company at a price of 20 cents per unit and flow through shares of the company at 25 cents per share. Gross proceeds are expected to be approximately \$2.5 million, the company said.

### SPEEDING UP PERMIT APPROVALS ON PROVINCIAL MINING MINISTER'S MIND

Changes are coming to Ontario's Mining Act.

Cutting red tape to improve the industry's competitiveness still remains top of mind for Energy, Northern Development and Mines Minister Greg Rickford, who hosted the 41st annual Meet the Miners Day at Queen's Park, Oct. 29. Rickford also took the opportunity to huddle with his panel of industry experts on the government's Mining Working Group. Created earlier this year, the group is composed of leaders from the mining and exploration side, prospectors, and representatives from Indigenous business organizations. "I am encouraged by our discussions so far and look forward to our continued collaboration," said Rickford, who acknowledged the contribution of Chris Hodgson and his team from the Ontario Mining Association for their input in finding ways to cut regulatory red tape. That includes making legislative changes to boost Ontario's profile as an attractive place to invest.

### RICKFORD TAKES LEAD IN BATTLE TO MODERNIZE ONTARIO'S MINING ACT

With Ontario's legislative assembly back in session at Queen's Park as of last week, Kenora-Rainy River MPP Greg Rickford is moving forward his agenda to reduce provincial bureaucracy hindering the mining industry, including changes to the Mining Act. Rickford said he held consultation meetings with stakeholders in several provincial industries over the summer, including the Mining Working Group, formed earlier this year to reduce red tape in the mining sector. Rickford says regulations complicate the process As the minister of Energy, Northern Development and Mines, Rickford met with the group on Tuesday, Oct. 29 at Queens' Park for Meet the Miners Day. "Generally speaking, every sector had a consensus that our system was too expensive and too complicated," he said.

## \$777-MILLION NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO TRANSMISSION LINE PROJECT WORKS BEGIN

Right-of-way clearing and access road construction has started for a \$777-million, 450-kilometre-long transmission line that will follow the Lake Superior shoreline from Thunder Bay to Wawa in Northwestern Ontario. Tidmarsh says NextBridge has worked closely with Indigenous communities along the project right-of-way and they formed the Bamkushwada Limited Partnership which, in turn, owns Supercom Industries which will select and hire the suppliers and contractors for the project with a focus on Indigenous workers. "Through this partnership, NextBridge has trained over 200 Indigenous people to work on the project and once the line goes into service, Bamkushwada will have the option to become economic partners in the East-West Tie," she says.

# **COURTS DENY MOST FIRST NATIONS INJUNCTIONS**

Shiri Pasternak suspected corporations likely won more injunctions than First Nations did in land disputes. But she was shocked after she and her fellow researchers began crunching numbers. The team at Yellowhead Institute, an Indigenous-led think tank, reviewed nearly 100 injunction cases. They found corporations succeeded in 76 per cent of injunctions filed against First Nations, while First Nations were denied in 81 per cent of injunctions against corporations.
