Earlier this summer, Dettah Chief Edward Sangris said the Yellowknives Dene First Nation (YKDFN) was pulling the plug on its support and cited concerns about "antiquated methods of procurement and Indigenous engagement." YKDFN said in a news release that it hoped there would be more priority given to "capacity building, benefits for Northern and Indigenous business, local hiring, and community engagement." BILL 197 COURT ACTION PROCEEDINGS MOVING FORWARD

"We're challenging two legislative things that the government of Ontario did — one of them was to bring in pretty sweeping changes to the Environmental Assessment Act, and that's what was done through Bill 197 (COVID-19 Economic Recovery Act)," says Kate Kempton, partner at OKT Law and one of three lawyers for the First Nations in the legal proceeding. "And the other related move they made is a couple of weeks before they did that (Bill 197) they revoked environmental assessments in the forestry sector, so that was done as a separate move by Ontario through a regulation. So we're challenging both of those things as unconstitutional and violations of First Nations rights." ELON MUSK'S SATELLITE INTERNET PLAN GETS GREEN LIGHT FROM CANADIAN REGULATOR

The Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission has approved an Elon Musk-owned company's application to provide low Earth orbit satellite internet to rural Canadians. Space Exploration Technologies Corp (SpaceX) is Musk's rocket and spacecraft company. One of the company's projects is to bring high-speed internet service to hard-

to-reach rural areas around the globe by launching thousands of small satellites that will orbit just 550 kilometres above the Earth, vastly speeding interaction with residential computers on the ground.

The Mining Association of Canada and mineral industry partners undertook extensive research on how remote and northern mining costs compare to those in the south. Our research indicates it costs 2 to 2.5 times more to build the same precious or base metal mine in the North (off-grid) than in a centrally located region and, most importantly, that 70 per cent of this cost differential derives from the infrastructure deficit.

INVESTORS WORTH \$10.2 TRILLION PRESS GLOBAL MINERS FOR TALKS ON INDIGENOUS ENGAGEMENT

Institutional investors worth \$10.2 trillion (7.8 trillion pounds) have written to the boards of global mining companies to better understand their engagement with First Nations people, in the wake of Rio Tinto Ltd's RIO.AX destruction of Juukan Gorge rockshelters. The group of 64 investors and their representatives, including the Church of England Pensions Board and the Australian Council of Superannuation Investors (ACSI), issued a statement on Thursday. The group has written to the boards of mining companies operating in Australia and internationally to seek assurances about how they gain their social licence to operate with First Nations and Indigenous communities, they said.
